PATIENT EXPERIENCE SABOTAGING

We have heard it many times before. The primary demographic of our customers need paper forms because they don't do well on computers. While this may remain to be true for patients over 75 years old, the computer fluency of the cohort 65-75 is generally pretty good at this point.

And when you send a ream of paper to just about anyone under the age of 65, they begin to wonder what century you are operating in. When a computer-fluent patient sees the same old paper forms that would have been used in the 90s, they begin asking questions of the modernity of the practice.

REDUNDANCY INCREASING

We've all been there — filling out the same questions over and over again every time we go somewhere like a medical practice. So much time is being wasted in the reception area on gathering standard information that you already have.

WORKFLOW EXPANDING

Multiple people in a medical practice need to have access to the proper forms. With paper forms, only one person can look at it at one time.

CLOUD NONEXISTING With paper forms, once the information is gone ... it's gone forever. When in doubt, you have to prepare. _ What is your disaster recovery plan for the paper forms you maintain? **COMPLIANCE CHALLENGING** On paper there is no such thing as a required field ... Any important information can be mistakenly skipped, and when it comes to HIPAA or MACRA the reason it was missed does not matter. It can potentially cause billing to be rejected, a fine to be incurred, or worse — cause a well-meaning practice to lose a malpractice case. How do you currently make sure patients are filling out the necessary information? How often do patients miss important parts of the forms they are filling out? MEDICAL ERROR INCREASING When paper forms are used, you don't get any of the advantages of using computers. They can easily apply algorithmic patterns for you. For instance, "if this drug is used, then this drug should not be used." Or "if this surgery was done, then this follow-up needs to happen." When you have to dig for the list of the drugs or fail to carry out a follow-up, the patient can be in serious danger. What percentage of your time is spent looking for information in different documents? Have you ever witnessed a patient safety incident occur because of human error? **OUTCOME HOPING** Paper forms do help improve outcomes if they are followed very closely and none of the information is corrupted or just completely missed — but this is only in a perfect world. And unfortunately, we don't live in one. Your bottom line, your office space, your doctors, your patients' experience, your staff, your workflow, your data security, your compliance, your malpractice premiums, your patient outcomes, and the planet ... they're all being affected by your use of paper forms. Isn't it time you made those forms ... Shareable Forms?

Reflect on your answers and see how much it really costs to use paper like we're still in the 90s. Healthcare is long overdue for an upgrade.
